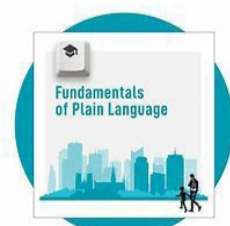

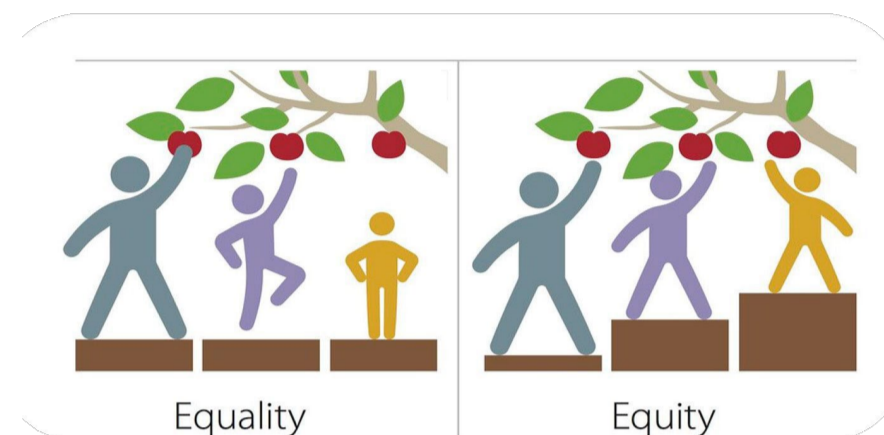


Learned about the 'Stop Special' campaign

Supportive Education in New Hampshire: Pathways to Access

- **Legal Protections & Equity**
Rights guaranteed under IDEA, Section 504, and ADA ensure equity, accessibility, and full participation for all students
- **Individualized Supports**
Accommodations, behavioral supports, and assistive technology promote inclusive, safe learning environments
- **Future-Ready Services**
Transition planning prepares students with disabilities for life beyond school, including higher education, employment, and independent living

NH Legislation Challenging Supportive Education

HB 699: Relative to special education definitions

- Removal of key definitions of special education law in New Hampshire
- Redefines "special education environments"

HB 115 and SB 295: Expanding the number of students eligible for education freedom accounts

- Eliminates income eligibility requirements for school voucher programs
- Shifts money from public schools to private schools
- Increases risk of segregation and restrictive placements
